Kuwa ("mulberry")



Black fully ripe fruits are produced around June and July. They are sweet and edible. It has been cultivated since long ago for its use as feed of silkworms used in silk production.

Kuwako ("wild silk moth")



Kaiko ("Domesticated silk moth")



Wild variety of silk moth.
Larvae eat the kuwa leaves.
Adults are found from early summer
to autumn.
